



Gifted and Talented News

This year in the gifted room has been very exciting and busy. New this year, we have two classes at the junior and senior high levels. Junior high students are being challenged to design, price, and create a slideshow to try to sell tiny house designs to an imaginary city council as a means of helping homeless families. In addition, some junior high students have been working on various engineering projects and the Math Olympiad. Senior high students who have opted to take the gifted class are working on independent research projects of their own choosing. Topics this semester range from the occupation of the Baltic states to dystopian literature to the reality versus

the media portrayal of pirates. Each project will result in a presentation of the author's choosing at the end of the semester.

At the elementary, we continue to have pull out groups to challenge them in reading or math at the second through sixth grade level. In addition, kindergarten and first grade classes have a thinking skills class each week that challenges them to use different types of thinking, from detective thinking to scientific thinking. The activities in these classes stress using our minds to solve problems and organize information as well as creative and critical thinking.

In fifth through eighth grade, students again this fall

participated in the Thinking Cap Quiz Bowl, an online quiz bowl competition against schools from around the country. Although all classes did a great job representing Colfax-Mingo, our fifth and sixth grade classes especially shined, placing 14th out of 71 schools and 19th out of 74 schools respectively and getting 95% of the questions correct in the 100 question quiz. They will all be participating in the spring contest as well, and high school will participate in a competition in January.

Junior and Senior High students will also be participating virtually in the Iowa Science Bowl this year in January and February. This competition is among students in a variety of Iowa junior and senior high schools. Both of our teams of 4-5 students have been determined for this year's competition, and their preliminary rounds will be completed soon.

Fifth and Sixth Grade students are also participating this year in the Math Olympiad. For this competition, students take five separate math quizzes with advanced problems in the months of November through March. At the end of these guizzes, the student in each grade with the most total correct answers wins the competition and is awarded a trophy. Any students that meet specific requirements for the state averages also may receive a patch, pin, or ribbon for their efforts.


