are. Unfortunately, situations of poor choices make the news and get attention from some legislators looking for political gain, while these daily heroics get looked past.

Elementary School News

The elementary just completed the second trimester of the school year. It's hard to believe we are two/thirds of the way through the 2021-2022 school year! The beginning of March brings parent-

teacher conferences. The elementary will host conferences on Thursday, March 3rd and Tuesday, March 8th. Spring break follows parent-teacher conferences and will run from Friday, March 11th through Friday, March 18th.

One piece of data that the elementary uses to assess progress is the number of students at benchmark on our grade level literacy assessments. As a building we increased our percentage of students proficient 65% in the fall to 71 % in the winter. We will add one more data point this spring to our progress. We were extremely pleased with the growth made so far this year. The elementary has been focusing on our literacy skills this year. Dr. Anderson will discuss some of the other data that we have collected around literacy in this newsletter. We are ex-

tremely excited with our progress but also know we have work to do the remainder of the year to continue the celebration.

There is no data collection for math at this time. We do have different math assessments that are given across the building but nothing that is consistent like the literacy piece. The building added a new math series this year and we have been consistently looking at grade level assessments to track progress of our students. That information will be shared with families at parent-teacher conferences.

Elementary school counseling

This year the elementary school counseling department has grown in more ways than one. We were so excited to add another full-time counseling position this year and have been incredibly pleased with the abundance of knowledge and compassion that Kristjana Smith has brought to our

school. Mrs. Smith is currently teaching one section of kindergarten through second grade classes each week, facilitating small groups, and counseling students individually as well.

Our Colfax-Mingo Elementary school counselors are reaching ALL students, kindergarten through 6th grade, through weekly classroom counseling lessons. In comparison to last year, K-2 students are receiving triple the amount of lessons, while 3rd-6th graders are receiving over 30% more curriculum. Lesson topics include: skills for learning, emotional regulation, goal-setting, growth mindset, and more. Our goal is to empower our students to be successful academically, social-emotionally, and in their postsecondary and career aspirations.

We have also been able to offer more skill-building opportunities for students to continue to develop and practice their skills in a safe and structured small-group environment. These students have enjoyed fun and interactive learning activities that help them develop and enhance their study skills, emotional coping strategies and friendships. The school counseling department has also been able to provide individual interventions to 42 students through solution-focused brief counseling and skill-building activities. This is more than double the number of students that were served last year.

As a team, the school counselors are extremely excited to see what the future holds. We are committed to creating a comprehensive and data-driven school counseling program that ensures the success of all students in our building. One of our aspirations is to earn the title of a Recognized ASCA (American School Counselor Association) Model Program (RAMP) school. RAMPing is a long and detailed process and has only been achieved by a handful of schools in Iowa. This is a distinction that would further demonstrate our immense dedication to providing our students with all the tools they need to be successful in the future. We are continuing to push forward in the process and will keep the community updated in our progress towards this goal. We thank you for all of your support and collaboration in working with your students. Please continue to reach out if we can be of any assistance.

March Newsletter Article – Elementary Data

This year, our district has been engaged in learning about how to become a High Reliability School – one that functions at a high level no matter what the circumstances. We have been learning to incorporate the idea of "prove or improve," meaning that we need to prove that what we're doing works, or we need to improve it. One thing we realized is that we are lacking some data to show what and where we need to prove or improve our practice.

At the elementary, we followed guidance from the state in looking at one of several indicators that determine the "health" of an organization. One of those indicators is universal instruction, or the instruction that is available to all students. Beginning with the literacy content, the state

guidance indicates that we should first determine whether we have set aside between 90 and 120 minutes daily for literacy instruction. Teachers documented their daily literacy schedules, and all students are indeed receiving at least ninety minutes of literacy each day.

The second level of inquiry about literacy is the use of those instructional minutes. We did not have any data to show how many of the literacy minutes were used for teaching and learning, and how many minutes might be used on other activities such as giving directions, making transitions between activities, having breaks, and so forth. The goal that the state has set is that at least 95% of the literacy minutes are used for teaching and learning.

In order to collect some data, Mrs. Engle, Mr. Summy, and Dr. Anderson completed classroom observations in the fall of 2021. At that time, the building average was 89% of literacy minutes used for teaching and learning. While that is very close to the 95% goal, the staff believed they could improve because fewer literacy minutes over time can have a negative effect. The teachers did some reflecting on how the non-literacy minutes could be shortened while still building in those necessary brain breaks.

The third level of inquiry concerns student engagement. The state's goal is that 80 to 90% of the students will be engaged 80 to 90% of the time. We also did not have data about this level of inquiry, but the staff had completed several sessions of professional learning about engagement strategies. We decided that the second round of observations in the winter of 2022 would gather data on both literacy

minute usage and student engagement.

During the second round of observations, the building average of instructional minute usage jumped to 95.6%!

Additionally, the average level of student engagement was 91%!

This accomplishment is a result of diligent efforts each and every day by our skilled professionals at Colfax-Mingo. They have truly embodied the idea of continuous improvement, and we couldn't be more proud of our staff. Please join us in celebrating these dedicated educators.

Our work is far from done, however! We will begin our next leg of the journey by examining our instructional standards, materials, and practices for alignment and adherence to best practices. Stay tuned for more updates about our progress.





From the Desk of Mrs. Lancaster:

We are well on our way into the second semester and making great progress! I have included some snapshots regarding attendance and academics. At Colfax-Mingo Jr/Sr High School, we strive to improve the attendance of our students on a daily basis. Each minute of the school day provides opportunities for learning, and it's noticeable when students miss time. The first chart shows the number of students with 3, 5, or 10+ tardies for each month this school year. As you can see, we are trending lower for



those with 3-4 unexcused tardies, which is great! However, we are starting to go back up in the number of students with 5+ unexcused tardies. Our goal is to continue lowering unexcused tardies overall. The second chart shows the percentage of students in each grade level that have attended school at least 85% of the school year. This is an area for improvement across our building. As we head into spring, please remember that every missed day is a missed learning opportunity. If you or your student are needing support with attendance issues, please reach out to us so we can find ways to support your child in their education journey.



I also want to share the component recovery opportunity students were offered to improve their final grades and demonstrate a higher understanding of skills taught so far this year. One-third of our student body chose to participate in this opportunity! This was an option for all students, not just those who failed a course. Our teachers worked hard to

develop activities and assessments for students to demonstrate new learning. Below is the average GPA by grade level after the first semester. Our goal is that by the end of the year, each grade has an average GPA of at least 2.5, which

we are well on track to achieve! The component recovery opportunity, along with consistent attendance, is a great way to reach this goal. I am looking forward to a great second semester and finishing the year strong!
